Parish Update

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Message From the Rector:

Lord, Make Me Grateful (but don't make it hurt)

Dear Friends,

Recently I used a line on my son Wesley that I thought I'd never use. Maybe you remember similar lines from your parents: "Eat those peas, there are starving children in Africa." My line, in response to his complaint about his awful life was, "Do you realize you have a better life than 99 percent of the kids in the world?" Statistically that's true, of course, of all suburban American kids that eat three meals a day, wear nice clothes, ride around in cars, take vacations, and watch (too much) TV. But as the words came out of my mouth I realized they probably sounded as dumb as the "eat your peas" argument. Until the grateful logic moves from the mind to the heart it's just words, it doesn't register. But when gratitude settles in the heart, mundane things take on a whole new meaning; getting it there, though, like all true changes of the heart, is often painful, and only comes about by the grace of God.

Let's face it, most of us, as the song says, "don't know what we've got 'till it's gone." For instance, how many of us as young kids woke up on a bright summer day and thought about how grateful we were for our peppy bodies and carefree days? Actually, most of us probably complained that we were bored. Now that we're weak, flabby, and have jobs we're much more

grateful for times of recreation or just pain free walks around the block. "Oh," we say, "how grateful I would be to have that body and free time again." But why weren't we grateful then? Mainly for two reasons: One, we didn't know the alternative (ie. life without all we had); and two, our hearts, like all human hearts were (and are) basically self-seeking and helplessly unsatisfied. We need a change.

When Wes and Maddie were infants so many parents would say, "Love them now because before you know it they'll be all grown up." To be honest, for years it didn't sink in.

Life was stressful, personal time was rare, and the selfish heart wanted its own way. In recent years, though, as God has revealed the true depravity of my heart and allowed me the grace to acknowledge the truth and receive his forgiveness, something amazing has happened. Love for our children has increased more than I ever thought possible. I want to savor every moment I can.

The other day I was riding the Harley (yes I am in a mid-life crisis) back from the driver's test that I had just failed due to a technicality (I moved the bike from the testing center parking space without my helmet on). Ok, it was stupid. The guy wouldn't even give me the test. I had broken the law. On the way home on a nice summer day as I grumbled and beat

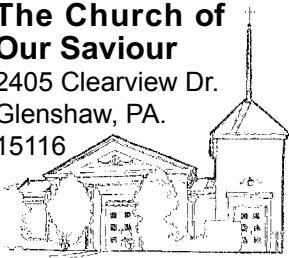



Spotlight on Missions

This will be the first of a series of articles to highlight for you the work of our mission partners (those we support financially and with our prayers).

Margarita Grachen should be familiar to all of you from the Prayers of the People each Sunday, even if you did not get a chance to meet her on one of her visits here with us in 2003 and 2004. She is a missionary with the South American Missionary Society (SAMS) which is based in Ambridge.

Margarita and her two adopted children Hannah and Gabriella having been living in Honduras for the past 3 years and are coming back to the states this summer for Margarita to be on educational furlough, taking mission-related classes at Trinity Episcopal School for Ministry in Ambridge.

Margarita is a native of Puerto Rico who came to the US to attend college and pursue her dream of becoming a prima ballerina. After college she got married and instead of becoming a ballerina, she became a banker, ending up as an Assistant Vice President in PNC's Treasury Management Department. After the break up of her marriage, she began attending the Alpha course at St. Stephen's Church in Sewickley. There she accepted Christ as her Lord and Savior and continued in the discipleship program of adult ed at St. Stephen's.

During one of her courses, she and the others in the class were asked to go off and reflect on the question, "If there were no restrictions or barriers, what would you most like to do for God?" She found herself, to her own amazement, answering that she would like to start an orphanage in Central

America! Her rector's wife put her in touch with SAMS and she began to explore the possibility of doing just that.

She accepted a call to go to Honduras, even though the bishop there told her that his first priority for her would be to help with the administrative affairs of the diocese to get them on a solid base of financial practices. Secondly, he wanted her to use her financial acumen to begin a micro-enterprise development program to help poor women start small businesses.

Beginning an orphanage was to be her third priority. However, once she got to Honduras, the bishop changed his mind! So for most of the last three years she has been working on purchasing land and building a day-care center and orphanage in a
